We can identify potential policy responses to demographic change and analyze the impact of current or proposed policies on specific populations.



Number of foreign-born residents in North Carolina, 1990-2021





NC immigrant population growth above US nationwide


Growth of foreign-born population by state, 2011-2021


Metro areas home to largest immigrant populations

Foreign-born impact felt in both urban and rural


Foreign-born as a share of total population, by county, 2021



Growth of immigrant Share of NC population, 1990-2021




North Carolina foreign-born residents by country of birth, 2021



Mexico, Central America, and Asia most common origins NC foreign-born population by world region of birth, 2021




Immigrants come to NC as refugees each year

NC helped settled 469 refugees in FY2020 and 1,163 refugees in FY2022




Only 26% of NC Immigrants Do not Speak English Well or Very Well





% of NC public school students with non-English home language by county, 2020




Number of languages other than English spoken in homes of NC public school students by county, 2021

Top five languages among NC Foreign-Born, 2021









Age structure of U.S.-born vs. foreign-born, NC, 2021




Almost 1/3 NC immigrant children live in poverty

Foreign-born population below 100% of the federal poverty line by age in NC and US, 2021




NC immigrants less likely to receive cash assistance

% foreign-born ages 15+ receiving cash assistance, by age, NC vs. US, 2021




NC immigrants less likely to receive SNAP benefits

% foreign-born receiving SNAP benefits by age in NC and US, 2021




NC immigrants less likely to have health insurance

% foreign-born with health insurance, by age in NC and US, 2021




NC immigrants less likely to have Medicaid
